MESSAGE FROM THE 6981ST CIVILIAN SUPPORT GROUP



Hello Members, Friends, and Family of the 6981st,

Another challenging year in several aspects will be over soon. At this time I would like to recall some of the events and tasks we had and supported during 2011. Again we had teams deployed to MK Airbase (Romania), Camp Darby (Italy) and at this time to Brussels, Belgium. In Schweinfurt we installed new ICDS's at several buildings for the USAG to provide the necessary network environment for incoming units. In Mannheim, Kaiserslautern, Wiesbaden and Sembach we have been tasked to install CDS and ICDS networks to support moves of units into interim and final locations. At Ramstein we supported the Air Force with installing network infrastructure to stand up their Deployment Transition Center. In Stuttgart we completed several projects for EUCOM and AFRICOM. Grafenwoehr were another time heavily involved in exercise support and the installation of ICDS/PDS and CDS networks at Hohenfels to support JMTC requirements.

During the year we also assisted the Brigade/5th Sig Cmd with fulfilling special tasks and last minute requirements to enable them to accomplish their mission. The unit was winner at FY10 DA-AAME competition and won again the NETCOM AAME competition for FY11. In May the unit had its 59th anniversary and is looking forward to celebrate the 60th anniversary on May, 2 2012.

We trained about 70 Soldiers on FO-cable work in one week training sessions throughout the year and included confined space entrée training with support of the 2D Signal Brigade Safety Manager Jim Speelman into our schedule by establishing a confined

space training area (the only known one in the USAREUR footprint).

This year we received again an outstanding CIP result of 98.6% and were awarded the Safety Streamer for outstanding achievements in the field of safety readiness and implementation within our unit and all our tasks and missions.

We celebrated Length of Service jubilees for 20, 25, 30 and 35 years with the 6981st and we said Good Bye to colleagues and friends as they retired after decades of service. We also welcomed new hires who soon were part of the units' specialists and teams. All in all we had an excellent and successful year within the 2D Signal Brigade family and 5th Signal Command.

39TH SIGNAL BATTALION NEWS: GERMAN MOUNTAIN TRAINING

The 39th Signal Battalion sent five Soldiers to German Mountain Training in Bad Reichenhall, Germany. This training was coordinated and planned by the German Army. The 39th Signal Battalion's close relationship with the German Support Unit on SHAPE, Belgium enabled this joint training. Our partnership in such a small community makes training available that otherwise would not be available to either of our forces.

Although air transportation was scheduled, weather forced a last minute switch to plan B (ground transportation). Day one started with an 11-hour bus trip from SHAPE to the base of the mountain. After equipment & personnel accountability, a brief rest, and other preparation, the group hiked up the mountain to base camp (Lenzenkaser III), which is located at 1560m above sea level. That evening, the main group was split into two smaller groups, with the German and American personnel equally divided between the two.

After a good night's sleep, the second day saw one group hike to a nearby mountain peak at 2257m and back – a total hike of approximately 20 kilometers over rough terrain. At the same time, near the base camp, the other group trained in mountain rescue techniques, followed by rock climbing and rappelling on the side of the mountain.

On day three the two groups switched, each conducting the training that the other group did the previous day and the final day consisted of a cleanup of the base camp, a hike back to the base of the mountain, and the 11-hour return trip to SHAPE.

During the last two months, 128th Signal Company was busy conducting its daily



missions, ranges, and various types of training including, warrior focused training - focused on Shoot and Move, as well as mandatory training including - online and classroom training, in order to get the battalion to the required level of excellence. We have also had excellent events such as the Hail and Farewell, the Annual Pumpkin Carving Contest, which brought out more that 40 attendees, and a spiritual fitness run. On October 14, 128th also participated in a battalion Safety Stand Down day with classes like – Alcohol and the Holiday Season, Winter Driving Safety Briefing, Cold Weather Injuries, Suicide Prevention and Fire Prevention / Holiday Hazards to name a few.

The 128th Signal Company is currently preparing for upcoming morale events during the holiday season as well as training events including the Commander's Prime Time Training. Our morale events include two Thanksgiving Day pot-lucks, a Children's Christmas Party and a Battalion Holiday Party. 1SG Foster (Bulldawg 7) and I (Bulldawg 6) would like to thank the 128th Bulldawg Soldiers and Civilians for their continued hard work during these pass two months and look forward to continued excellent efforts conducting our Mission here in Belgium.

Greetings from the Soldiers and Civilians of the 43D –Always Professional Signal Battalion.

The 11th Signal Detachment officially cased its colors on 23 September 2011 in Mannheim, Germany. Inactivating a strategic communications detachment presents a number of unique challenges including: personnel management, equipment accountability, and maintaining the mission requirements. I wish there was a Field Manual dedicated to inactivating a unit as it is much more complicated than I originally suspected.

The People

The strength and morale of the unit rests on the Soldiers, Civilians, and Families that make up the unit. Keeping moral high during the inactivation process was a challenge that was mitigated only by direct involvement from the chain of command, communication, and sound leadership. Throughout the inactivation, the Detachment leadership placed an emphasis on the Soldiers' continued self-improvement and on Family Readiness Group events. Realigning and cross-training proved to be an effective method in helping the countless number of supply transactions I talk about next.

The Equipment

A theater-level COMSEC detachment has an incredible amount of equipment. It was astounding what a non-deployable strategic Signal unit can collect over several decades. The Detachment worked tirelessly from January – October 2011 to turn-in and transfer equipment. There were countless trips to the Defense Reutilization and Marketing and the Supply Support Activity to assist with the turn-in of all the equipment. Turning in the property book items only touches the surface of what

most units have in terms of equipment, property, furniture, and other items. Units as far as Ansbach, Germany arrived on our doorstep to pick up furniture or other equipment. The Detachment's flags, streamers, and plaques were shipped to the US Army Center of Military History in Alabama and tents were shipped to Korea. A solid relationship with the Property Book Officer was essential for all the mountains of paperwork needed to complete the inactivation. It seemed with each item we turned in, three new pieces of equipment appeared to take its place.

The Continuous Mission

The mission of the 11th Signal Detachment had to continue despite the personnel shortages and equipment turn-ins. The Theater COMSEC Management Office continued their support to their customers located throughout Europe by realigning personnel, cross training, and rely-

ing on the outstanding support from the Civilian workforce in the Detachment. We also underwent two major inspections this past summer by the Department of the Army Inspector General and the Communications Security Logistics Activity, which added to the complexity of the inactivation.

It is Finished

Inactivating a unit is a long and difficult process that requires planning, attention to detail, and support from all personnel. By placing a priority on taking care of the Soldiers the property transactions and missions were accomplished. Serving as the last Commander for the 11th Signal Detachment was a unique honor and privilege. Next time I will be sure to read the "Inactivation Field Manual" first.

Fortunately, throughout this process, we had much support from many technically proficient Soldiers and Civilians throughout 2D Signal Brigade.
